Whereas, we have said that we desire to seek reconciliation as individuals and as a congregation,

Be it resolved, that members of Bethel Mennonite Church commit to rid themselves of any hatred, resentment, prejudice, dishonesty, and any other thought or action that keeps us from seeing and receiving other people as our brothers and sisters, wondrously made by a God who deeply loves each one of us. May we as a community, as families and friends, and as individuals learn and become enabled into a posture that seeks repentance, healing, truth, and reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in and beyond our communities. We commit ourselves to these specific acts of reconciliation:

Building relationships;

Listening generously with open hearts and minds;

Educating ourselves;

Integrating insights and lessons from Indigenous peoples into our worshipping and spiritual life; and

Seeking out projects of partnership with Indigenous peoples.
